

A word from the Bishop of Dunwich

Dear All Harvest

Time for some old favourite hymns at Harvest time – *We plough the fields and scatter* for instance – and that classic *All things bright and beautiful*.

But I wonder whether, despite the familiarity of such hymns, people singing it come anywhere close to hearing their messages. For instance, do we take the hint of the words in All things Bright and Beautiful to pause to consider how gazing upon our world can change the quality of our experience, our consciousness, our outlook? I am looking out of the window in a hassled and anxious state of mind, blind to my surroundings, brooding on too much to do or some other burden (imagine one for yourself, a sore throat, a wound to one's prestige, whatever). Then suddenly I observe the colours outside, lit by the fading sunlight of dusk...in a moment everything is altered. The brooding self with all its burden disappears for a time. There is nothing now but that array of colour and atmosphere. And when I drag myself back to my preoccupation, they seem somehow less important. And of course, they are less important. This is something we can do deliberately; give attention to creation in order to clear our minds of self-obsessed cares. But it seems even more purifying when it just happens, when we take a self-forgetful pleasure in the strange and beautiful existence of that which is around us. It can be transfiguring. And what we pay attention to shapes us more than we usually think.

The findings of a large-scale study on stress published & flagged by the BBC a while back suggested that brooding too much on negative events is the biggest predictor of depression and anxiety and determines the level of stress people experience. The research even suggests a person's psychological response is a more important factor than what has actually happened to them. Equally well then, the effects of being taken out of our-selves by that which is lovely can be transformative positively.

A word from the Bishop of Dunwich continued ...

Harvest is that time of the year when we really pause to pay attention to the world around us, grateful to that which not only physically sustains us but which 'sings' to us. In St Paul's words, "Finally beloved, whatever is true, whatever is honourable,. Whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is pleasing whatever is commendable, if there is any excellence, and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things" Phil 4.8.

Sound advice, indeed, you could say 'bright and beautiful'.

Why Belong To Church?

Many people are struggling to connect with church today following the pandemic. However, we should 'not give up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing' (Hebrews 10:25). The church is not simply a building or services, but a shared friendship with Jesus, as the New Testament makes clear.

1. The Family of God

The church is a community united by their love for God and readiness to sharing this love with others: 'a people belonging to God, that you may declare the praises of Him who called you out of darkness into His wonderful light' (1 Peter 2:9). It is in the life of the church that people can connect with God's love.

2. The Body of Christ

The church is also Christ's body on earth, 'The body is a unit, though it is made up of many parts; and though all its parts are many, they form one body. So it is with Christ' (1 Cor 12:12). We all have a unique contribution to make, using our different gifts, experience and passion. However, beware of those attitudes that stop us representing Christ: inferiority ('I have nothing to offer') or superiority ('I don't need you').

3. A Holy Temple

In the Old Testament the temple, was God's home on earth; now the church has become His home: 'In Him the whole building is joined together ... in Him you too are being built together to become a dwelling in which God lives by his Spirit.' (Ephesians 1: 21,22). Church is a place where people can be loved, accepted and welcomed home. Is this our experience of church and what changes would make it more as God intends?





Orchard Cottage in Dallinghoo where my aunt and uncle lived, was surrounded by a vegetable garden with Hollyhocks growing between the stones nearly blocking the front door, but it didn't matter as it wasn't used much, only to get auntie's posh maroon bicycle out (it was too good to keep in the shed.) Out the back was a very large pig, ready for the butcher. We had to save the wee from the chamber pots to rub on its back to stop it getting sunburnt! Then there was an orchard after which the house was named and beyond that the dairy farm. The Risk family ran the dairy farm in Brandeston. One very snowy winter when all the roads were blocked and the milk tanker couldn't get through, all the villagers flocked to the farm to buy milk, any left over was poured down the drain. Later the farm sold raw milk straight from the dairy and eggs and seasonal sprouts by the roadside. Happy memories.

Wild About Campsea Community Garden

We are a group of nature enthusiasts who are encouraging village residents to devote a minimum of 20% of their gardens to wildlife-friendly features such as planting for pollinators, log piles, ponds etc. We also help to look after public open spaces in the parish such as a wild-space at the west end of the village where nightingales nest, together with the church yard at the east end which is a haven for wild flowers and insects.

Working with the Parish Council and the Village Hall Committee we have sourced funding of £2000 from Councillor Poulter's Community Enabling Budget and £4900 from East Suffolk Council's Mental Health Booster Fund to create the start of a community garden on the village recreation ground. Over the spring and summer we constructed raised beds and hurriedly planted our first crop of vegetables and herbs, then built a cabin to serve as a workshop and classroom for young and old to share their knowledge and skills. The winter period will see tree and shrub planting around the perimeter of the recreation ground (saplings supplied by the Woodland Trust) so that in time we develop a "food forest" for birds and human foragers to share as well as some willow planting to supply craft materials. We're also busy collecting seeds and seedlings for future plantings.
